GEORGIA ROVING By Len Smith

On Saturday, August 24, two Mustangs and a Corvair headed to Gainesville to the Fifth Annual Happy Heart car show. Mustang John was driving his GT-350 clone, his friend Tyler was driving a red 65 Mustang that he had bought from John last year, and I was piloting my 65 Corsa turbo. This show was to benefit the American Heart Association, which was why I allowed John to talk me into being a judge at the show. We had modified the classifications this year to group vehicles by year of manufacture. That proved to be difficult based on the diversity of entries. There were about 100 vehicles entered. I now understand why the shows down here award Top Twenty (or whatever number) based on the judges' opinions - much easier to judge without overlooking some deserving vehicles. Lesson learned; we did our best. There was a vast variety of cars to peruse. There was the usual selection of 30s and 40s street rods along with a cool custom 50 Ford, which looked retro. A nicely restored VW Thing was one of the later-model entries, along with a pair of Ferraris. One entry consisted of a pair of custom motorcycles along with a late-model Scion. A pair of late 60s big-block Chevelles caught our eyes for their well-restored engine bays. The greatest range was represented by a pair of survivors - a Model T Ford touring and 63 Ford Galaxie. A 65 Impala was on display by its original (and only) owner. A pair of early 50s Chevy pickups displayed great patina, contrasting with a well-restored red early 50s Dodge pickup. We enjoyed inspecting all the entries and did our best to decide on the trophy winners. The day was sunny and the people were friendly, so we had a great time. See photos on the website.

The following Saturday, the 31st, there was a benefit show in nearby Clermont. John was having electrical problems with his Mustang, so he opted out. The weather was iffy, so I decided to go without the Corsa. Jody and Pam had called and expressed an interest in attending, so we arranged to go with them. Naturally, as soon as I hung up the phone, the weather cleared a bit. Oh well. We wended our way north to Clermont and could not locate the show based on the information that we had. We drove around and finally decided to head out. We turned onto a main highway and voila!- there was the show. It was a fairly small show with about 45 cars, but again, there were cars that we hadn't seen before. Up front was a white 59 Chevy Impala hardtop near a 67 Ford 427 Fairlane. We also found a modified 50s Willys Jeep station wagon across the field from a military Jeep complete with mounted machine gun. A flat black postwar Ford coupe was powered by a flathead, while a Model A pickup was displayed with a "moonshine' theme complete with flathead four-cylinder engine. Some late 30s Mopar street rods shared space with a basically stock 56 GMC pickup. The sun was getting warm, so we spent about a half-hour walking around, looking, and taking pictures. We decided to go a little farther north to Dahlonega, which has a lot of shops and eateries. We walked around, shopped, and had a late lunch. On the way back home, we hit some of the rain that had been promised. All in all, a fun day. Pictures from the show have been uploaded.

September 7 brought the monthly swap meet at Atlanta Dragway. John and Ruby were in Pigeon Forge, so the Corsa and I soloed. This was another big swap meet, with over 100 vendors and about 30 cars on display near the grandstand. As usual, there were project cars and parts galore offered for sale. Some of the project cars included a nice blue early Barracuda, a 40 Chevy sedan, 2 Firebirds, a T-bucket, a Vega drag car, a First-Series 54 Chevy pickup, and a Beetle body ripe for a Corvair engine swap Once again, no Corvair parts and nothing that I needed more than my money. The display area boasted, among others, a 63 Dodge 2-door with a 440, a clean 57 Ford Fairlane, a rat rod with a blown small-block Chevy, a cool flamed 50 Merc custom, a 50s Dodge panel truck, a rare early 60s Ford Econoline pickup, and a 56 Chevy D/Gas sedan. Check out the photos.

That evening, we again cruised to Hoschton for the monthly cruise-in put on by the American Street Rodders club. The weather remained sunny and warm, so we had about 60 cars show up. Some of the more noticeable entries were an early Falcon with big tires and a tunnel ram, a 66 GTO convertible, a 60 Ford Starliner, and a 72 Buick Skylark 455 convertible. Some of the rarer cars that I noticed were a 55 Olds 4-door, a 63 Comet convertible, a 54 Mercedes coupe, and a twin turbo 2002 Camaro SS. A couple of hot rods that caught my attention were a late 40s Dodge pickup with Hemi power, a rat rod powered by a Mercruiser 4 cylinder, and most of all, a replica 60s era Willys gasser with a blown Hemi. The owner drove it to and from the show. I was recruited as a judge (again); the choices were difficult. We chose the Top 25 to the best of our ability; I hope we sent a bunch of people home happy. On the way home, I lost my dash lights and tail and stop lights. Fortunately, we were only 4 miles from home and made it safely. A check found several old fuses that had separated; they came out in several pieces. A change of fuses and cleanup of the fuse holders remedied the problem. Got photos.

Saturday the 14th found us in Hoschton again, this time for a show sponsored by our club, the American Street Rodders. It was a benefit for a local church, so we took both the Rambler and the Corsa. It was held in the parking lot of a mini-mall: we missed it on our first pass. Because of a number of shows nearby, we had a small turnout, about 35 cars, many from our club. Despite this, there were nice cars entered. Some that caught my eye were some Tri-5 Chevys,including a 57 Chevy "fuelie" packing a later model engine with fuel injection, and an El Camino with a big engine and nitrous. Some of the hotter engines were in a Road Runner with a tunnel ram and 2 4s and a 40 Ford coupe with a blower and no hood. Early models included a pair of 34 Fords, one a resto-mod and one a street rod, a T-bucket, and a red modified Model A sedan. The car that intested me most was an unusual 55 Chevy. Check the pictures to see it. Much to our surprise, both Sher and I were awarded Top 20 plaques for our cars. They must have felt sorry for our "orphans". Also, we both won door prizes. We had nice weather, friendly people, and good conversation. An enjoyable time.

That evening we made the half-mile trek to downtown Maysville for the monthly cruise-in, the first that hasn't been rained out in quite a while. There were about 20 entries, which is about normal. Some of the more intersting ones (to me) were a pair 31 Model A sedans, one with a later V-8, the other with a later V-6 and a pair of almost matching 66 Chevelle SS396s, one an automatic and one a four-speed. An early 60s Ford panel truck was almost back- to- back with a big 40 Ford truck with a later drivetrain. Two of the most interesting entries were a 62 Thunderbird Sport Roadster (with the fiberglass tonneau), a swing-away steering wheel, and wire wheels and a 26 Ford tall T with a Jag IRS. Again, both of us got door prizes. A profitable day. Check out the photos.

Kitchen Corner

Herbed Roast Chicken

1 (2 gal) resealable plastic bag

½ c orange juice

1/3 c olive oil

2 Tbl butter, melted

1 Tbl balsamic vinegar

1 Tbl Worcestershire sauce

6 cloves, minced

1 Tbl minced chives

1 Tbl dried parsley flakes

1 Tbl dried basil

1 tsp salt, 1 tsp pepper

½ tsp each dried marjoram & rosemary

1/4 tsp dried tarragon

1 (6 to 7 lb) roasting chicken

Combine all ingredients and put in bag And marinate 8 hours or overnight. Drain And discard marinade. Place chicken in roasting pan. Bake at 350 for 2 ½ to 2 ¾ hrs or till reaches 180 temp.

Honey Kissed Acorn Squash

2 acorn squash, halved lengthwise & seeded

1 (8 oz) can crushed pineapple, drained

½ c chopped pecans

1/4 c dried cranberries

 $\frac{1}{4}$ c + 2 Tbl honey

1/4 c butter, melted

ground nutmeg

Place squash halves, cut side up, in micro dish. Micro 10 mins on high or till tender. Combine Pineapple and next 4 ingredients. Spoon into squash. Micro on high 30 to 45 secs or till heated through And glazed. Sprinkle with nutmeg.

Pumpkin Doughnuts

41/2 c flour

4 tsp baking powder

3/4 tsp salt

1 cup sugar

1 tsp nutmeg

1 1/4 c milk

1 egg, slightly beaten

2 Tbl butter, melted

½ tsp vanilla

Mix all and roll dough onto well floured surface only until blended. Roll dough to ¼ inch. Cut with 2½ inch floured cutter. Fry in deep fat At 375 until golden brown, turning when first crack appears.

Drain on paper towels and dust with sugar. Makes 2 doz

Everybody there enjoyed the entertainment. The next day, @95 Corvairs were parked at Clark's for the show. It was a big challenge keeping Phil from buying more cars etc! As it was, he bought a LOT of needed items for this winters work. Good thing I had room in Rampy under cover for the ride home. Weather was super nice, and all had a good time. I was once again surprised by a visit from Bill from the northwest territories!, It was good to shake his hand again. Last time he came up to me out of the blue was at a small car show in Manchester VT.

Between shows and other responsibilities, we have been hard at it all year in the shop. I had to shuffle things around to get one more car inside last week. I am slowly planning a full busy winter of Corvairs and Ham radio.

I got to road test Carburetor cleaning (got into dirty gas) on Beatrice Van by going back over to the Jordan Show to put a belt on Phil's Rampy before he went home. Beatrice has a wish list that I MAY be able to do before winter, not sure yet. The 64 convertible powertrain is all apart getting a good cleaning and detailing, along with many other updates before heading to the body shop.

My Rampy is getting a lot of work this winter also. It has a bad side carrier gear , which lets the right axle "jump around" too much , and the wrong early powerglide transmission. I am also going to make changes to the motor. Driving it the "scenic" route to Mass showed me things I need to do yet. The route is the Mohawk trail , (rt2) which between Troy NY and the Middle of Mass has some serious long steep grades and hairpin turns to test your car , new or old.

IF you have a Ham license, it helps to bring along a radio on our tours. If not, It would be very nice to have CB radios in your car. 
