.The last weekend of September was a busy one for us. On Thursday, the 26th, we went with some others from the American Street Rodders to a Chinese buffet restaurant in Athens. There were about 28 of us who gathered there to eat (great food), talk, and enjoy each other's company. On Friday night, we went to a cruise-in in Commerce being held in conjunction with the Gear Jam, nostalgia drag racing, being held on Saturday at the Atlanta Dragway in Commerce. I think that a lot more cars showed up than the organizers had planned on. They were scrambling to find parking spaces for all the cars. Sher brought her Rambler, I drove the Corsa, and John and Ruby came in his Mustang. We were parked in the driveway of a restoration shop which had a number of cars undergoing work. As we wandered, we saw a wide assortment of vehicles ranging from stock restorations to drag cars, probably a few of which were going to race on Saturday. Among the cars most interesting to me were a 61 Ford Starliner with a big block, a 59 Chevy wagon "Ol' Skool SUV", a bullet-nosed Studebaker with a big block, a cool slightly modified 55 Chevy Nomad, and a Falcon Ranchero done up like a monster truck. There were several 56 Chevy gassers and a C/Altered Henry J. One 56 Chevy gasser driver got a little over-enthusiastic and put on a little sound and speed demonstration. This was followed by a sound and light show consisting of a siren and flashing lights. We saw the Chevy cruising later at a much more sedate pace. One nice surprise was that Sher's Rambler won a plaque at the show. We left before the awards were given, so we didn't find out about it until we were at the car show the following day. Saturday found us at a car show put on by the American Street Rodders in conjunction with the Hoschton Fall Festival. There were a lot of cars there from our club, as well as many others. There were probably close to 100 cars entered, which is a good turn-out. We took both the Rambler and the Corsa since the weather was great. We arrived, parked, registered, and said hello to some of the other club members. Cars kept rolling in as we wandered, so there were lots of cars to see. Some of my favorites were a 65 Impala convertible powered a 496 big-block, a restified 55 Nomad with a color-coordinated engine compartment, and a fiberglass 37 Ford sedan delivery which, I was told by the owner, was 1 of 2 made by the company before they went out of business. Some of the more unusual entries were a 48 Packard street machine, a 90s V-12 Jaguar, and a customized lawn mower plus a Ford tractor powered by a flathead V-8. The only other air-cooled vehicle there was a 65 Porsche. My Corsa didn't feel so lonesome. We checked out some of the arts and crafts booths and then watched the parade, which passed right behind where we were parked. The weather was great and we got to talk to quite a few people, some of whom thought that Sher's Rambler was a Studebaker. What nerve! But we set them straight. All in all, a fun day. On Saturday, October 12,we attended the last Maysville cruise-in for this year. Thanks to John, who called to remind us, we rolled down to the center of town to participate. Despite the nice weather, there were only about a dozen cars on display. One newbie was a Suzuki Samurai with a Chevy V-8 shoehorned into the engine bay. There were several familiar cars also; see the photos. Everyone who brought a car received a plaque. Trophies were awarded to participants who had attended the cruise-in frequently this year, including John and Ruby and Sher and me. We'll be back in April 2014.

On the 17th and 18th, we took a trip to Chattanooga with Jody and Pam. We drove over on Thursday, had lunch, and did some sight-seeing. We visited the Chatanooga Choo-Choo site and looked around. Jody and I visited a model train museum with a large HO scale setup. The display was about 100 feet long and about 20 feet deep. It was built and is maintained by a local model railroad club. That evening, we attended a mystery theater dinner and had a good time. Friday morning, we took a river cruise on the Southern Belle. After lunch, we did more sight-seeing and then, on the way home, stopped at a large antique mall. We detoured to check out a 77 Lincoln Continental with 20 thousand original miles at the shop where Jody's son, Chris, works. It was in good shape, but needs some cosmetic work. Sher took it for a test drive, but we decided that we really didn't need it. We continued toward home, stopped in Alpharetta for dinner, and we arrived home about 9:30. Saturday was rainy, so no car show. I put a few pictures of our trip on the website.

Sunday the 20th was the fall picnic for the American Street Rodders. It was held at the Staghorn Pavilion near Nicholson, about 25 miles from us. Kitchen Corner

Creamy Turkey Casserole

1 can cream of mushroom soup

1 can cream of celery soup

1 ½ oz pkg onion soup mix

1 c instant rice, uncooked

1 ½ c milk

2 to 3 c turkey. Cooked and cubed

bread crumbs

Combine 1st 6 ingredients; spread into

9x13 ungreased baking pan. Sprinkle with bread crumbs. Bake at 350 for 45 mins.

Caramel Apple Salad

1 (8 oz) cool whip

1 (3 1/3 oz) pkg instant butterscotch pudding mix

1 (8 oz) crushed pineapple

2 c apples, cored, peeled and diced

1 c dried roasted peanuts

1 c mini marshmallows

Mix Cool whip, pudding and pineapple together. Fold in remaining ingredients. cover and keep refrigerated until ready to serve.

Mini Pumpkin Tarts

Topping

1/4 c flour

¹⁄₄ c sugar

1/4 c pecans

2 Tbl butter, softened

Crust

3/4 c butter

2 (3 oz) pkgs cream cheese, softened

1 ½ c flour

Filling

1 (14oz can) sweetened condensed milk

1 1/4 c canned pumpkin

1 egg

tsp pumpkin pie spice

Topping

Whipped cream, if desired

Combine all topping ingredients to course

crumbs. Set Aside. Combine butter and cream cheese; Beat till mixed. Add flour, continue beating till dough forms. Dived into 36 pieces. Place 1 into each un-

greased

mini muffin pan. Press onto bottom and sides of cups. Combine all filling ingredients and pour into cups.

Sprinkle

with topping. Bake at 375 for 25 to 28 mins. Cool 5 mins

Store refrigerated.

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

TIM'S TECH TIME AND RAMBLIN'S

HI THERE, it sure is hard to believe another month has gone by already!

This summer has flown by!. My Rampy is getting a lot of work this winter. It has a bad side carrier gear, which lets the right axle "jump around" too much, and the wrong early powerglide transmission. I am also going to make changes to the motor. Driving it the "scenic" route to Mass showed me things I need to do yet. The route is the Mohawk trail, (rt2) which between Troy NY and the Middle of Mass has some serious long steep grades and hairpin turns to test your car, new or old. Rampy got so hot it turned on the temp light before the top of the hill. It ran good after that, but I knew it needed work soon. So after running it several hundred miles, the day after our tour it sounded like a blown head gasket on the left side (hardest side to work on in a FC without removing the motor all the way). So what do I do? Wait till winter, and do it all?, (would mean driving a modern car in the midst of antiques on the last tour of the season) or try a "quick fix" right now!. Well in spite of all my aches and pains, I took a Tuesday and changed just the left side head gaskets. The #2 cylinder gasket (good copper one!) actually shrank in size @1/8 inch overall, then formed a leak after shutting the motor down from our tour of @100 miles. Weirdest failure of a head gasket I have seen in many years. I included photos I took while it was apart. So far we have been @300 miles since replacement with no further situations. It is about time to clean it up and store it until I get time to really concentrate on all the things it needs. I plan on mods to the exhaust system, headlight wiring, backup lights, and other options already partially installed last winter. My biggest problem is working my own projects in-between Phil's giant wish list. The plus side is, we got to enjoy a lot of fun hours of events and drives this year in the Rampy.

Last week we reviewed Phil's 64 Spyder coupe at Dave's shop. What a terrific job they are doing on it. There was a lot of metal damage to repair. This should be a top notch car when finished.

This week's projects are carburetor rebuilding, and cleaning up the motor, transmission, and differential in the convertible. All parts are back from the powder coaters. Now to reinstall all of them. I will be busy for a long time.

I am putting a few photo memories on page 8 and elsewhere for you to enjoy. Some show things I am working on.

When we tour It would be very nice to have CB radios in your car. Those "emergency" portables work great, and are quick to install or remove. Having communications helps a lot, and also is "entertaining" on tours. Warning about obstacles in the road, or other situations, it could even be a safety concern sometimes.

It is VERY important that you get E mail versions of my posts, or you WILL miss a lot of important information. Mainly show events and application blanks needed to put your cars in them, plus other newsletters from around the state and the country. Also watch carefully for attachments, most show blanks are now PDF files.

We just can not mail all of this out.

We hope to see you all at the next event! . It is always good practice to let the organizers know if you are coming to events. Be sure to keep your eye on the club website http://www.cnycorvair.com/CNYCorvair.php Jim does a great job of keeping things interesting and up to date.
