Kitchen Corner

Homemade Turkey Soup 1 leftover turkey carcass 2 qts water 1 onion, halved ½ tsp salt 2 bay leaves 1 c chopped carrots 1 c uncooked rice 1/3 c chopped celery ¼ c chopped onion 1 can cream of chicken soup

Place carcass in stockpot; add water, onion, salt and bay leaves. Bring to boil over low heat; cover and simmer 2 hrs. Remove carcass; cool. Strain broth & skim fat. Discard onion and bay leaves. Return broth to pot. Add carrots, rice, celery and chopped onion; cover and simmer until rice and veggies are tender. Remove turkey from bones; chop turkey and add turkey and cream soup to broth; heat through.

Stuffed Turkey Breast Dinner 1 (8oz) pkg herb stuffing cubes ½ c dried cranberries 1 (14oz) can chicken broth 8 turkey breast cutlets 2 (12 oz) jars turkey gravy

Preheat oven to 350. Spray a 9x13 pan. Combine stuffing cubes, cranberries and broth. Mix well. Place cutlets on work surface and place equal amounts of dressing in center of each. Roll up each one and place seam side down in pan. Pour gravy over roll ups. Cover and bake 35 to 40 mins or till cooked through.

Baked Butternut Squash 1 med butternut squash (about 2 ½ lbs) ¼ c maple syrup ¼ c brown sugar 3 Tbl butter ½ tsp cinnamon ½ tsp vanilla dash of salt dash of nutmeg

Heat oven to 350. Grease a 9x13 baking pan. Peel squash, scoop out seeds, cut squash into ½ to 1 inch cubes. Heat maple syrup, brown sugar butter, cinnamon, vanilla, salt and nutmeg. Drizzle over squash in bowl and coat well. Pour into baking pan, cover with foil and bake for 30 mins. Remove foil, stir gently and bake uncovered about 15 mins longer or till tender.

TIM'S TECH TIME AND RAMBLIN'S

HELLO AGAIN EVERYBODY !

Another "fun" month here. We had a wonderful time on the 1000 Island boat tour . Our Heartfelt thanks to all involved for the really nice anniversary cake and Champagne memories. What a neat surprise! I heard later bits and pieces of the story of events leading up to sneaking it aboard. We are all glad the cake and "transporter" survived the dreaded "cake flip". I took a few pictures during the trip , but not as many as I should have. That whole trip event was a wonderful day . Our route back home with Rampy was on mostly back roads along the lakes edge. We were thru Clayton ,Cape Vincent , Henderson Harbor ,Sacketts Harbor , and then down thru Mexico etc . Rampy ran great all the way. The early FC transmission does not like the added power of the Late upgraded motor , but has survived a lot of miles so far , some of them hard ones. I hope to change that Transmission soon with a Late FC rebuilt one I have here waiting. What they say about early transmissions and late motors is very true , they spit a little bit of fluid out of the vent when they get mad. I run a triple sized cooler and good fluid , but It still does it. At least it has not left me walking yet! , and it goes like!

I have been working mostly on the new to us, Pearl White 62 Lakewood Monza. I am redoing everything to do with Brakes, new motor (110hp .060 over size, with OT20 Cam etc), and a 69 powerglide with an early passing gear lever installed.

This should make a nice "driver" fun car for us soon. My next fun job will be rebuilding the axle bearings. I have all brake parts ready to install. I even removed the backing plates to clean and paint, ALL tubing, hoses, cylinders, E brake cables, and a Dual master cylinder are new parts. I am also installing a NOS gas heater and 2 re plated bumpers..

This winter will be busy out in the shop, with at least 2 or more motors to build, and one other to repair or rebuild. Two are Turbo motors. This amounts to a LOT of hours cleaning parts! The results so far, are almost worth it.

Ron's son, Mark, is looking to sell the 61 4 door Ron was working on. He thinks it is mostly a parts car, unless you want to do a lot of work, mostly on floors etc. The motor and transaxle are in VERY good running condition. He also has a 64 95HP motor with std 3 spd and differential for sale. He is trying hard to move most of this stuff out by winter, which is looming. If you have any interest in anything there contact him, or myself soon. I bought the 65 4 dr with AC for parts. Only thing I need is the motor and transmission. The rest is up for grabs FOB here. I will scrap it by winter. It should be moved here sometime very soon. I will be anxious to get the parts I want off it and get the rest out of here asap.

We are looking forward to the club get together at Tabitha's Restaurant again this year. I hope you understand the need to respond to Rita as soon as possible, Time to call in numbers is approaching rapidly!




