

July 22, 2017 - Another hot and humid day in Georgia. A group of us decided to drive to Winder to attend a cruise-in put on by the Dixie Cruisers and then go out for dinner. The weather had been cloudy off and on, but the chance of precipitation was low. About 3 P.M. I decided to get the cars out of the garage. As I prepared to open the garage door, I heard a loud rumble. I looked outside - thunder and dark clouds. We decided to go with Plan B - drive our regular cars, see if the show was still on, and do dinner. George and Amelia came to our house at 4 P.M., just as the showers started. We rode with them and about 15 minutes later, we were under blue skies and sunshine. After a detour around road construction, we met the rest of our group at the show where it was, of course, sunny, hot. and humid. Due to the heat and the iffy weather, only about 25 vehicles showed up. Still, we found a shady spot to set up our chairs and to retreat to as we checked out the cars. Good food and good conversation, after which we arrived home at about 8:30. A good, fun day despite a few obstacles.

Saturday August 5 - the first Saturday of the month. Here comes the swap meet in the A.M. and the Hoschton cruise -in during the P. M.. Jody came to the house to join me at the swap meet and to use my lift to put quieter mufflers on his Grand Prix. He and Pam were tired of having to converse at the top of their lungs while riding in the car. We drove to the swap meet in my turbo car to let the Pontiac's exhaust system cool off. We cruised the aisles to check out the goodies. Jody hadn't been to the swap meet in several years and was surprised at how large it has become. We didn't find any great treasures, but we spent several hours walking and checking the vendors' offerings until the day became sunnier and warmer. We returned home to grab some lunch and to swap the mufflers. The job took only 2 hours and the result was a much quieter exhaust tone. We didn't attend the Hoschton show that evening, as we had been invited to a birthday party for Jody's daughter-in-law Megan. No collector cars at the restaurant but still a good time. I did post a few photos from the swap meet.

The following Saturday, we considered attending a car show at the nearby Jefferson High School. The reason for our indecision was the the iffy weather promising possible showers. We decided to chance it, so I pulled out the Rambler from the garage. I noticed that the oil pressure warning light stayed lit, even though the add-on gauge showed good pressure. Since the sky was clouding up again, I suggested taking the Corvair instead (metal roof and electric wipers). As I retrieved the Corvair, I heard something thumping on the underside of the car. When I got up to the driveway, I discovered that part of the tread of my left rear tire was coming loose. Not exactly safe. By this time it was almost noon and getting hotter, so we decided that we would be better off to skip the show. I later checked the date code on the tire and found that it was manufactured in August of 2003. Guess that its useful life had expired. I put the spare tire on - it was a JC Penney radial with no date code. At least it held air and kept the car from sagging. I'll swap it for one of my more recent tires in storage and shop for a new set of tires with a more recent date code. I also discovered on last Wednesday that the Rambler had a leaky bottom radiator hose (not a problem with Corvairs), so I'll add hose replacement to the list of repairs. We did attend the Maysville cruise-in Saturday evening (2 blocks away) and the Rambler engine did not lock up nor did my spare tire explode. Due to the heat and the iffy weather, only about 20 vehicles attended the show. The car that caught everyone's eye was a 1909 Buick. The body looked basically original and I found out from the owner that the engine had been rebuilt many moons ago. He cranked the two-cylinder engine and we listened to it chug away slowly and steadily. He had trailered it to the show, as its speed is not up to that of current traffic. We all enjoyed seeing and hearing this example of early automobile development. Of course I took and posted photos of this rare vehicle.

#### Kitchen Corner

#### **Apple Fritter Pancakes**

1 cup flour

1/4 tsp salt
2 tsp baking powder
1 egg, beaten
1 cup milk
1 Tbl oil
1/2 cup applesauce
1/2 tsp nutmeg
1 tsp cinnamon – sugar
garnish; butter, powdered sugar

Combine all ingredients except garnish in a bowl; mix well. Drop batter by ½ cupfuls onto a greased griddle set over medium heat. Flip pancakes when top starts to bubble. Continue to cook until golden on both sides. Serve with butter and powdered sugar.

#### Apple topping

To cook up a delicious topping for pancakes and waffles (and ice cream) melt 2 Tbl butter in a skillet over low heat. Stir in ¼ cup brown sugar and 2 cups thinly sliced apples. Cook & stir until tender.

#### Slow Cooker Cheesy Bacon Strata

10 eggs
2 ½ cups milk
½ tsp black pepper
1 (8oz) pkg Kraft shredded triple cheddar cheese,
divided

16 slices French bread, toasted, cubed 10 slices bacon, cooked crumbled

4 green onions, sliced

Whisk eggs, milk and pepper in large bowl. Reserve ½ cup cheese. Add remaining cheese to egg mixture with remaining ingredients; mix well. Cut 3 (30 inch) of foil. Fold 1 sheet lengthwise in half twice; repeat with second sheet. Fold remaining sheet to fit inside back edge of slow cooker; place in slow cooker. Crisscross foil strips; use to line bottom and sides of cooker. Spray inside with cooing spray. Add egg mixture. If necessary press toast cubes into egg mixture with back of spoon to completely moisten toast cubes. Cook on low 4 hours, sprinkling with reserved cheese for the last 15 mins. Cool slightly. Use foil handles to transfer strata from slow cooker to platter; discard foil.

#### TIM'S TECH TIME AND RAMBLIN'S

HELLO AGAIN from the little Corvair Shop in Memphis NY.

It sure has been a hard, fast, interesting summer! It went by so fast, it was hard to catch some recreation time. Between high water at Fairhaven on Lake Ontario all season, and projects going very slow in the shop, I think I missed a lot of it.

The crankshaft replacement job went ok, but with the heat, I could only work a little more than half a day before getting away from the shop. The truck runs very good again now. I also had to take the dash apart to sort out dash light wires that were put in incorrectly, and tweak the signal light switch linkage under the steering wheel. I certainly hope that was the last of that project. I took a few pictures of the motor being worked on. You have to take it ALL apart to change the crank. I have cheated on a few cam change jobs, but to change a crank, you have to go right down to bare block to do it safely.

I am presently reworking a few Generators for Phil. One of his had an armature come apart taking out other pieces inside. Make that at least 2 rare failures I have seen this year. Cleaning, detailing, and painting them takes patience and time.

I am still arranging parts that came from Ron's and East Syracuse estates. Trying to make room, and cleaning some of them has become overwhelming. I hated to see much of it tossed, because a lot of it will never be reproduced, and hard to find when you need it. I have watched way to much good parts get tossed, just in the last year or two. There needs to be a way to avoid this. I sure can't do it all. I hope to clean up, and rebuild as much as I can. I saved as many Alternators, Carbs, distributors, transmissions, speedometers, tachometers, and other parts as I can find room for. It takes time and energy to disassemble, clean, sort, and store these things.

Between Ham radio events, and the shop "happenings" we did take a few nice day trips in the truck. Our favorite areas to travel are along the shores of Lake Ontario. There is a lot to do and see in NY state. We went to the Fairhaven show in spite of the terrible weather, hoping the day would improve. But it was a mostly "sit and chat "show. Only @20 cars showed up, when usually the have close to 200 there. Our Erie canal dinner cruise had really nice weather, good food, and lots of information, making that a great time. The VW show was moved because of all the water on the field, and everybody loved the new setting, so we hope they can afford to keep it that way. There is always a good showing of creativity there, and it was the same this year. One neat thing was a couch made out of a BMW Isetta body. Lots of nice ideas there I also purchased some rare and interesting Corvair literature there.

We are getting ready to go to the Bi Annual Baystate Corvair show at Clark's Corvair. That is always a fun time. We come home from there for a few days , then head out to our annual V I C E tour in VT. Rita and I are the only ones (other than the organizers , Kathy and Bill Cotrofeld ) left, that have attended all 38 years of these terrific tours . It gets harder to do every year , but is worth it.

We will miss the Jordan Fall festival this year with conflicts, so I hope somebody gets up early to secure the club spot! All this means the year is winding down, and will focus around meetings at Tabatha's and planning on how to attack next year.

I have put a few pictures on page 8, from projects and events from the last month or so. I will be rebuilding the club trailer this winter. I could use some lifting help later on in Nov or so removing that motor (without damage to trailer). Then I will build the new one and redesign the control panel and wiring. I have added a battery maintainer so far. Several other features have come to mind to include. My goal is to get it to more shows of all kinds next year. One thing I need help designing , is a cover for the display , removable and possibly see thru. Something that can tip up , or be easily removed and set aside. Ideas?

That's all I can remember for this month, Please do your part to help keep Corvairs out in sight, and alive!






