Corvair Tools and Parts - Keeping it all together

Tools and Parts.

chances are good you are doing most,

if not all, of the work on your car, so you'll need some tools. And while I strongly recommend buying parts from the Corvair vendors, I have listed part numbers for some common items in case you need them the day before an event. Tools.

First of all, if it's broken, best to fix it before you get there. Don't carry around tools and parts because something is wrong and you haven't had time to repair it. Fix it where you have all your tools and supplies available if at all possible. However, at an event, or on a long trip you should have some basic tools with you for minor adjustments and in case something lets go, or breaks on a friend's car. I've also found a compact tool kit very useful for junkyarding where you don't want to lug a full size box.

Buying Tools.

For tools I strongly recommend buying good tools. Having a tool break in the middle of a job is irritating at least, and good tools won't slip off the fasteners as easily. There is great debate as to which tools are best, and certainly if you have the budget buying Snap-On or Mac is the way to go. Like most of us I don't have that sort of budget, so generally I buy Craftsman - they hold up well and you can get a replacement if one should break just about anywhere in the U.S. Whatever brand you pick, make sure you get a lifetime warranty, and don't buy junk.

Carefully selected tools from Harbor Freight is another good way to go. If no store nearby, try online ordering. Tool Lists.

Smitty Smith's "Press On Regardless Kit". (I consider Smitty a top "go to" for Corvair help.) Smitty Says:

Onward and upward, never say die. It is amazing how the Corvair can get you there against all odds if one shows just a little ingenuity. Tain't gonna happen with a new car. Several years ago as I was pulling into a camp ground with the camper on the back of the wagon a guy in a pickup was pulling out. He rolled down the window and said, either you are the best mechanic in the world or the most crazy S** Of A B***h in the world. That's the way it should be for all of us. Our badge of honor. If you leave home with it, then come back with it running.

Oil pressure switch socket.:

The oil pressure switch for the warning light has an eight sided edge, not a hex, and to change it you should use a special socket - not pliers! While you

can get a generic socket from the auto parts store that will remove and install the switch without breaking it, Kent-Moore made a "J" tool that fits our cars without removing the alternator or fuel lines. Mac Tools made one as well, it seems to be a pretty close copy of the K-M tool, I have one and checked the fit on a friend's '63. Sure enough, just take the wire off and you can sneak it in there. The K-M tool is J-21757 (thanks to Joel McGregor for the number) and the Mac version is SC40, but be aware there are later versions that are taller, you want the one that the main body is about the same height as the width.

I grind the bottom of the socket down, and put a line at the top so I know where the terminal is . I use a "wobble drive" extension. TC.

Kitchen Corner

Company Chicken
6 boneless skinless chicken breasts
6 slices swiss cheese
1/4 lb fresh mushrooms, sliced
1 (10 3/4 oz) can cream of chicken soup
1/2 c dry white wine
2 c herb seasoned stuffing mix
8 Tbl butter, melted
Preheat oven to 350° Place chicken in

Preheat oven to 350°. Place chicken in a greased 9X13 pan. Top each piece with Cheese. Arrange mushrooms over cheese. Mix soup and Wine together; pour over chicken. Sprinkle Stuffing over top & drizzle with melted butter. Bake 35 to 40 mins.

Greek Chopped Salad

1 cucumber

4 to 5 ripe Roma tomatoes

1 lrg red bell pepper

1 small red onion

1 (15 oz) can garbanzo beans, rinsed & drained Dressing;

3 Tbl red wine vinegar

2 Tbl olive oil

2 tap dried oregano

1/4 tsp salt

Whisk dressing ingredients & set aside. Dice the cuke, onion, bell pepper & tomatoes (remove any excess liquid from tomatoes). Put veggies and beans in a lrg bowl. Add dressing & toss to combine.

Peach Pie

2 (9") pie crusts

5 c peaches, peeled, pitted and sliced

2 tsp lemon juice

½ tsp vanilla extract

1 c sugar

1/4 c cornstarch

½ tsp cinnamon

1/4 tsp nutmeg

1/8 tsp salt

2 Tbl butter, diced

1 to 2 Tbl milk

1 Tbl course sugar

Line a pie tin with one crust. & set aside. Combine peaches, lemon juice, and vanilla in lrg bowl. Mix sugar, cornstarch, cinnamon, nutmeg, and salt together and add to peaches. Spoon into crust, dot with butter. Place top crust on, trim edges and seal. Cut vent on top. Brush milk over top and sprinkle with course sugar. Cover edges with foil to prevent burning. Bake at 400° for 50 to 55 mins until crust is golden.

HELLO AGAIN from the very busy little Corvair Shop in Memphis NY.

June was a very busy month for us, with Car events and Ham radio events. We had a great time at the 45th Recall. I use the Rampy a lot for the ham radio event each June, so I have been putting off changing the transmission and differential. Good thing I did, because I finally found someone that really understands troubleshooting Corvair powerglides. They said that my transmission is probably fine, and the converter was most certainly the culprit. I have never seen a bad one before. So I added a low mileage late converter to the job, and still replaced the tranny and went back to a 3:55 differential from the 3:27. I like the better pickup from the 3:55. 
